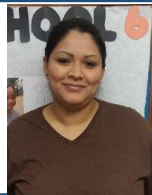

## Conscious Discipline Spotlight

Did you know that when you make physical and emotional connections with your child you are helping their brain develop? One of the ways we connect with our kids at school is through "I love you rituals"

### Try this at home:

"Twinkle, twinkle little star" (Wiggle your fingers with Child's fingers)

"What a wonderful child you are" (place hands on child's shoulders)

"With big bright eyes and rosy cheeks" (touch near child's eyes then cheeks)

"You're a talented person from your head to your feet" (touch child's head and feet)

"Twinkle, Twinkle little star," (touch and wiggle fingers) "What a wonderful child you are!" (hug)

# Infants & Toddlers

Studies have also shown that children who were read to as newborns have a larger vocabulary, as well as more advanced mathematical skills, than other kids their age. There's also a direct link between how many words a baby hears each day and her language skills. One study found that babies whose parents spoke to them a lot scored higher on standard tests when they reached age 3 than children whose parents weren't as verbal.



Hearing words helps to build a rich vocabulary in a babies' brain. But perhaps the most important reason to read aloud is that it builds the connection between you and your baby.
